The light that creates the work

Marco Angelini, a contemporary Italian artist, delves into the relationship between light and matter through his abstract works. Light does more than illuminate the surface of his paintings; it penetrates the material and stretches it, echoing Grosseteste's views. Angelini also incorporates the groundbreaking scientific theories of the 20th century, such as Planck's quantum theory and Einstein's theory of relativity, which forever changed our understanding of light, time, and space. His works become a kind of map tracing the propagation of light, where matter and energy intertwine like threads on a canvas, creating a three-dimensional drawing within a two-dimensional space.

Using a wide range of materials—acrylics, adhesives, threads, gold and silver leaf, copper plates, and even photovoltaic cells—Angelini manipulates light, creating visual effects that shift depending on the observer's angle, the intensity of light, and the surrounding environment. This gives his works multiple layers of meaning and invites viewers to reflect on how light shapes our perception of reality.

Light, in its symbolic and physical dimensions, takes center stage as the driving force of an aesthetic that transcends the physical limits of the environment, becoming a metaphor for life, hope, and progress. Angelini's works reflect the rapid technological transformations of our era, offering a complex and layered narrative that tackles the theme of energy transition. Through his art, he captures the vitality and resilience of life, urging us to illuminate the future—not just in terms of technological progress but also in fostering a more inclusive and socially evolved society.

In Angelini's creations, light serves not only as a physical element but as a symbol of growing knowledge and ecological awareness, aligned with the principles of a circular economy. Using light as a metaphor for the future, his work delivers a message of optimism and harmony between humanity and the environment, highlighting the tension between modernity and sustainability.

As light enriches space with meaning, Angelini's art becomes a vehicle for envisioning continuous improvement.

Through his daily dedication, we glimpse a future where light—an energy source and a symbol of enlightenment—

guides our civilization towards more excellent balance and responsibility. In this way, light in Marco Angelini's work transforms into an artistic and symbolic tool, embodying the power that gives form and meaning to existence. His works invite us to meditate on light, time, and space, pushing beyond the boundaries of traditional painting and expanding the horizons of contemporary abstract art. Ultimately, they celebrate light as a visual element and a profound symbol of an enlightened future that embraces both the individual and the global community.
